The better you know the language of the country where you live, the easier it will be to integrate into the local society. By mastering the language of a foreign country, you can better understand another mentality. And it will be easier to go to the store to shop. And if you fell in love with an amazing, unique person, the best in the world? Only there is one small problem - he is a foreigner and knows only "thank you" and "love" in Uzbek.

But this is not a reason to give up a great feeling. In this case, it will be especially easy to learn the language, because the teacher and assistant will be the one for whom everything was started. Psychological reasons do not imply an urgent need for language learning. If you have admired Japan, its culture and people all your life, then the desire to learn Japanese will be natural. If all your friends in your company know English and every vacation get together to visit New York or go to London for the Christmas holidays, then you will start learning the language so as not to stand out from the general background. As a rule, those who learn the language out of necessity do better at it. When you learn a language because it is so beautiful or because you are no worse than another, it can quickly get bored. After all, learning a foreign language is, first of all, work.

The process can be fun and interesting, but you still have to work and memorize a huge amount of information. But the results are worth it. Knowledge of another language allows you to expand the boundaries of your own world. It becomes bigger and brighter, more versatile and more interesting. If you try to go outside and ask this question: "Do I need to learn foreign languages?" to people passing by, you can hear: "Of course you need to!" The question is logical: "Why?"

But most foreigners speak several languages, and in our country few people know at least one foreign language. Interestingly, some fifteen years ago we also did just fine without mobile phones, and twenty-five years ago we felt great without computers. Can we now imagine our life without these things. we doubt it very much. So why do we buy a telephone, a TV set, learn to work on a computer, but do not know foreign languages. The answer is simple. We perfectly understand why we need a phone or a computer, but we have absolutely no idea what specific advantages and opportunities knowledge of foreign languages gives us.

What are these opportunities, and are there any real advantages for which it is worth spending a lot of money and time so precious for us to study foreign language. The first thing that comes to mind: Language is a means of communication. It is necessary for the transmission of information. But that's not all. The fact is that our language is inextricably linked with our thinking, as well as with imagination, memory and perception. It is impossible to conceive of anything without a language. We

think in language, or rather, we think in language. Uzbek - in Uzbek, Japanese - in Japanese, Spanish - in Spanish, etc. We think about what surrounds us, i.e. about reality. Therefore, we perceive and understand reality only through language.

Languages resemble mirrors in which reality is reflected, but there are many languages and they are all different, therefore each language reflects the same reality in its own way. So for the Uzbek "order" will be filled with one meaning, and for the German with another, the Indian with the word "snow" will associate one thing, and the Uzbek another, and so on. Even more interesting is the fact that language, which must be precise so that we can understand each other, actually turns out to be paradoxically imprecise and confusing. For the same reason that in addition to transmitting information, he must also participate in thinking. And since both reality and our ideas about it are constantly changing, the language must also be flexible, and therefore allow words to acquire new shades of meaning. Otherwise, a person will simply not be able to think and perceive something new for himself.

It follows from this that language is a gift that expands human abilities: thinking, perception, imagination and memory. But this same gift very often turns into our enemy, leading from misunderstanding to quarrels, conflicts and wars. Why? Because we do not use this gift, we do not pay attention to the language. We think without seeing it, forgetting that our thought is woven from the language itself. And only when faced with a foreign language, we suddenly begin to realize this, and again we discover both our own language and our thoughts. Language is a means that makes a person happy.

First, by studying a foreign language, we begin to better understand both ourselves and those around us. What's going on? Just before we come into contact with a foreign language, we believe that all words have only one meaning, which, by the way, is quite logical. Why does the subject at which we eat one more word besides "table" and, accordingly, why does the word "table" mean something else.

But in all languages, and Uzbek is no exception, most words have several meanings. The word "love" has some general meaning for everyone, but besides this general meaning, there are many additional ones that are different for different people. And when lovers say to each other: "I love you!", Very often they do not mean that they are putting different content in this word. Language is a means that turns a person into a Person with a capital letter!

Secondly, by studying and improving languages, we develop all our intellectual abilities. Only with the study of another language do we begin to pay attention to our own. After all, until we come into contact with a foreign language, there is no need for us to analyze our own, which means to delve into what we put into the words and phrases that we pronounce. We do not waste our time trying to figure out how we form our thoughts, how we form them into words, and whether we are expressing the thought that we actually had in mind. With the study of a foreign language, one way or another we have to separate words and thoughts, pay attention to our native language, and re-learn to express our thoughts in both our native and foreign languages. We seem to open up our inner vision, we begin to see shades of meanings, polysemy and difference of words.

A foreign language that is foreign to us awakens our native language and makes the thought work, to be clearer, more accurate and complete. Language is a means that reveals to us new riches and colors of the world. In addition, another language, reflecting reality in its own way, shows us it from a different side or in a different light than our own. There will be a feeling that our vision is becoming stereoscopic. We begin to see what people who know only one language do not see. This allows you to see the whole picture at once. Imagine that when you stand in front of your house, you see it from all sides at once: right, left, back, top, and even how X-rays are able to look inside and find out what is happening there. These are not even all the possibilities that knowledge of other languages can give you! And the more languages we learn, the richer our understanding of the world around us becomes. In addition to moments of self-improvement, you can look at the practical advantages and opportunities that are acquired through knowledge of a foreign language. After all, many are still more interested in what you can touch with your hands, which can bring real material benefits.

Results and discussion:

If, for the sake of interest, we take two translations of the same book and compare them, it will be surprisingly clear how they are not similar to each other, and there will no longer be any doubts whether to read or not read the works in the original. Knowing the language, you can watch films in the original. You can hear the natural voices of your favorite actors, and not the voice of the translator, who often voices both female and male roles.

And the wonderful play on words of a foreign language and their humor will no longer escape scrutiny. Indeed, quite often in translations of foreign films such lapses slip through, which simply change the meaning of what the actor had in mind when he uttered his phrase. Sometimes Uzbek swearing appears in films where it was even more absent in the English version, or vice versa, everything is so softened by censors that the film loses its flavor.
